The Board of Supervisors of Shelby County, Iowa, met pursuant to law and rules of said board in special session at 9:00 a.m. in the Supervisors Chambers of the Shelby County Courthouse with the following members present: Darin Haake, Chairman, Steve Kenkel, Vice-Chairperson, Charles Parkhurst and Mark Maxwell, Clerk.

The Chair asked that any conflict of Interest be stated concerning any item on the agenda. None were stated.

RESOLUTION 2021-12 APPROVAL OF FY22 MAXIMUM PROPERTY TAX DOLLARS

WHEREAS, the Shelby County Board of Supervisors have considered the proposed FY2022 county maximum property tax dollars for both General County Services and Rural County Services, and WHEREAS, a notice concerning the proposed county maximum property tax dollars was published as required and posted on county web site and or social media accounts if applicable, WHEREAS, a public hearing concerning the proposed county maximum property tax dollars was held on February 23rd, 2021. NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Shelby County that the maximum property tax dollars for General County Services and Rural County Services for FY2022 shall not exceed the following: General County Services \$4,586,035.00 Rural County Services \$2,285,000.00. The Maximum Property Tax dollars requested in either General County Services or Rural County Services for FY2022 represents an increase of over 106% from the Maximum Property Tax dollars requested for FY2021.

A roll call vote was held with Kenkel voting Aye, Parkhurst voting Aye and Haake voting aye.

The following resolution was then approved setting the date of March 16th at 9:00 AM for the final budget hearing fixing the budget for FY 2022, after Motion by Parkhurst and a second by Kenkel.

BE IT RESOLVED on this 23rdth day of February 2021, the Board of Supervisors of Shelby County, Iowa, met in special session for filing and considering the estimate of the County Budget for FY2022. There was present a quorum as required by law. Entry record for filing of said budget estimate was established and approved for publication. The Board, being fully advised, find that the date of the hearing on said estimate should be fixed, and it does fix, the 16th day of March 2021, at the hour of 9:00 A.M. as the date and time of hearing to be held at the Supervisor's Chambers in the Courthouse in Shelby County, Iowa. The above and foregoing resolution was adopted by the Board of Supervisors of Shelby County, Iowa, on February 23rd, 2021, the vote thereon being as follows: Ayes: Darin Haake, Steve Kenkel and Charlie Parkhurst Nays: None
